We served youth and adults with an intellectual disability ages 14 and over who would like to learn more about living a healthy lifestyle through the Go Girls! and Game On! programs.

During the past year, Big Bunch groups have done various activities within the community. Some activities the groups participated in were bowling, swimming, hiking and going to the movies. Many Big Bunch mentors transferred their file to be a Big Brother or Big Sister volunteer with a Little from their Big Bunch group. Parents, mentors and Littles have reported they are enjoying being involved with this program. This program greatly benefits children who are waiting for a traditional match by allowing them to become involved with BBBS and encouraging them to make new friends within the agency.

This year has been busy with events and activities. Thank you to our amazing volunteers who make our events and activities possible. Sharing these memorable experiences together is what makes people feel a sense of Big Brothers Big Sisters community. The events and activities also give delivery staff an opportunity to see the matches interact with one another.

It's hard to believe that I have been a part of the Big Brothers Big Sisters team for a year and a half already! I can finally say that I have had the opportunity to participate in nearly all of the BBBS activities and events that take place over the course of one year. I was always impressed with the quality of the activities and the perfected execution of each! I consider myself particularly lucky to have had the opportunity to work with such a dynamic group of youth in the Youth-in-Transition Program, a special group of bigs, littles and parents in our traditional programs as well as such a strong group staff at the office.

The Youth-in-Transition Program has been such a fun and rewarding experience for me thus far. The program continues to grow with the help of my colleagues, community partners and the youth. Over this past year, our relationship with the Children's Aid Society has strengthened enormously. We have had the opportunity to work collaboratively to develop a Work Plan which outlines service delivery, agency events and activities, workshops and our partnership. We will continue to work closely and further expand our partnership by including other agencies such as the Community Counselling Centre with whom we will be meeting in September.

Furthermore, the Youth-in-Transition Program has expanded to include more group workshops and activities this year. For the 2014-2015 winter season, we ran our first series of group sessions for the youth called "Independence Group". The majority of the workshops were run by community partners, allowing the youth to develop comfortable relationships with these outside agencies. The youth in the program have also been getting involved in our BBBS events and participating in activities specific to their program such as our sailing event and trip to Canada's Wonderland. We have been attaining and surpassing our targets set out by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services with the Youth-in-Transition Program in the past year.

Ashley and I were also given the opportunity to attend the National Convention at the Institute for Learning in Toronto again this year. It was both exciting and fascinating to share our experiences here at Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay with so many others from all over Canada and beyond. I attended a workshop by that was particularly interesting to me that talked about mentoring youth in care. The workshop was hosted by two BBBS agencies in Alberta that have been running a mentoring program specific to youth in care. I look forward to examining their model and implementing some of their programming at BBBS North Bay in the near future.

It has been a pleasure to work alongside such great people and learn so much about this wonderful agency. I look forward to the year ahead as we continue to work together to deliver quality mentoring programs to the young people in our community. 

Nature Of Operations

Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated is an incorporated non-profit organization established to provide professionally supported mentoring relationships to local children. The organization is a registered Canadian charity under the Income Tax Act and as such is not subject to Canadian income taxes.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The organization's significant accounting policies are as follows:

a) Revenue Recognition

Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue for the year in which the related expenditures are incurred. Unrestricted contributions and contributions towards the Delores Klingspon Achievement Fund are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

b) Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, equities traded in an active market are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in operations. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment, if applicable. Financial assets are tested for impairment when changes in circumstances indicate the asset could be impaired.

c) Capital Assets

Capital asset additions with the exception of the building are charged to current expenditures in the year of acquisition and are not reflected as capital assets on the statement of financial position.

The building is recorded at cost and amortization is provided on the diminishing balance basis at a rate of 5%.

d) Investments

The organizations' investments consist of mutual fund units held with a brokerage and are initially recorded at cost and subsequently measured at fair value without adjustment for transaction costs that would be incurred on disposal. Changes in fair value are recognized in income in the period. Transaction costs associated with the acquisition of these investments are recognized in net income in the period incurred.

1. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

e) Use Of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditures during the year. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the estimated useful lives of capital assets. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

f) Contributed Services

Directors, committee members and outside volunteers spend time to assist in the organization's activities. While these services benefit the organization considerably, a reasonable estimate of their amount and fair value cannot be made and accordingly, these contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

2. Financial Risks And Concentrations Of Risk

The organization is not exposed to significant financial risks except for market risk. Market risk is the risk of loss associated with fluctuations in share prices of investments held in public markets. The organizations' market risk is attributable to its investments. The organization manages this risk by regularly monitoring investment activities and having professional advisors manage the portfolio.

There has been no change to the risk exposures from 2014.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Directors
Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay
and District Incorporated

Report on the Financial Schedules

We have audited the accompanying financial schedules of Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated – Bingo and Nevada Funds which comprise the schedules of assets, liabilities and equity as at March 31, 2015 and the schedules of revenue and expenditures and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management and Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management and directors are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management and directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial schedules based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial schedules are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial schedules. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial schedules, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial schedules in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial schedules.

We believe that the audit evidence that we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Because we did not observe the counting of any possible physical inventory or cash on hand at the end of the previous or current year and since inventory and cash on hand enters into the determination of results of operations, we were unable to determine whether adjustments might be necessary to revenues, expenditures, net proceeds, current assets or equity.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial schedules present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated – Bingo and Nevada Funds as at March 31, 2015, and its results of operations for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Nature Of Operations

Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated operates a bi-weekly Bingo at a bingo hall that utilizes the pooling method, whereby revenues are allocated equally amongst participating charities. The organization also administers the sale of break open lottery tickets, known as Nevada. Net revenues generated by the Bingo and Nevada are donated to the Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated and are used to assist with the funding of operations.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations. The organization's significant accounting policies are as follows:

a) Revenue Recognition

Bingo and Nevada revenues are recognized when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

b) Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. All cash equivalents have been designated to be in the fair value category, with gains and losses reported in revenues. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment, if applicable. Financial assets are tested for impairment when changes in circumstances indicate the asset could be impaired.

2. Financial Risks And Concentrations Of Risk

The organization is not exposed to significant financial risks or concentration of risks.

There has been no change to the risk exposures from 2014.

3. Income Taxes

Big Brothers Big Sisters of North Bay and District Incorporated is a registered Canadian charity and is not subject to income taxes.
